Board Chair Report

Congratulations on another successful year for the Hamilton City Netball Centre.

Over the year ended 30 September 2023 player numbers have again increased and the Hamilton City Netball Centre continues to provide opportunities to participate in netball and sport in a variety of ways. As well as playing, or being involved in holiday or skills programmes, participants can assist through coaching, umpiring, game officials, game-day assistance and other volunteer roles.

Clare and her team continue to provide good support for the centre and community to ensure it can deliver netball. The team is always ready to improve, or try new things, to keep netball and participation progressing.

During the year the Strategic Plan for the Centre was updated. Our overall theme is “Providing a Lifelong Connection to Sport through Netball”. This reminds us that as well as providing netball opportunities, the Centre is part of a wider community.

This year our organisational skills came to the fore when we hosted both the national Under-18 and the UNISS (Upper North Island Secondary Schools) tournaments. Well done to everybody who made these events a success.

At a national level Netball New Zealand is currently assessing the sustainability of netball both at a national level as well as what the on-going Zone structure will be. We will continue to provide feedback on this and assist where we can with future Zone and national developments.

The financial report shows that for the year ended 30 September 2023, the annual result, before depreciation, was a surplus of \$39,545. After accounting for depreciation the final result is a deficit of \$35,787. The annual net cash in-flows from operations were \$16,989. As a result, the Centre remains in a healthy financial position.

Thank you to all funders and sponsors who support us. Remember to support those who support us.

Coming up, the new Incorporated Societies Act requires that all Incorporated Societies, including the Hamilton City Netball Centre, re-register with a new constitution by April 2026. The board will be working through the requirements for this over the next 12 months.

Other plans over the next 12 months will be to progress a new lighting system for the courts.

This is my last year as Board Chair. I have enjoyed my time on the board and being able to provide assistance to the netball community. While many things have changed at the Centre over the years, being able to ensure that we have permanent employed staff to support the Centre, helps to ensure that we remain a sustainable organisation.

The HCNC board continues to have a good mix of skills, to provide relevant support to the Centre Manager and the Centre - thank-you to past and present board members.

Finally a thank-you to those of you who contribute to ensure we remain a successful Netball Centre.

Centre Manager Report

2023 was a very busy season which offered many opportunities for us to showcase our Centre and our sport to the wider community. It is through the teamwork of a great many of the members of our community that 2023 will be remembered for its positivity, fun and connection.

Circumstances over the previous 3 seasons meant that the Centre hosted both the Netball New Zealand U18 Champs and UNISS (Upper North Island Secondary Schools Netball Competition), in one year instead of 2 years apart. The Centre after the recent renovations to the courts and buildings, was in a good place to be able to host these events. Many teams had not visited the Centre since the renovations and we received many compliments on not only how the Centre was looking and functioning as a venue, but also on how welcoming the people from our Centre community were.

U18 Champs the Centre played a facility provision role, which means that we set up and packed down each day, kept the toilets clean and stocked and our volunteers manned the registration window. The Netball NZ team commented several times on how organised the staff and volunteers were. Often, we had solved an issue before Netball NZ was able to ask us about it. The event had a great end for the Centre with our U18 team in the finals and finishing second and our U17 Mens team also making finals and finishing second. Including a Mens competition was a first for Netball NZ. Television crews were down at the courts to record this special occasion. This saw the Centre appear on two different TV stations with some of our players and coaches featured. Our sponsors logos featured prominently in the background of the footage.

UNISS can only be described as massive!!! 121 teams playing over 5 days; 125 umpires; 16 Umpire Coaches; 15 Selectors; 36 volunteers; 686 lunches provided. Days for staff and volunteers started at 6am and finished after 8pm at night. The Centre was not only a facility host but also organised and co-ordinated the tournament itself, except the draw. This meant many hours of work in the weeks and months leading up to the event. I became the Tournament Co-ordinator with a team of volunteers supporting me in key roles. This was only possible as Aoife Fyall joined us as the Junior Co-ordinator. Aoife completed a great team of staff who were able to do not only their own roles in this time but pick up a lot of mine as well.

With Sport Waikato we launched and successfully ran a “Positive Vibes Only” campaign during UNISS. This campaign was aimed at creating a positive atmosphere during the event for players and umpires in particular. It started pre-event with a social media campaign which highlighted the voice of our youth and what they would like their experiences at netball to be like. The colour pink was chosen as the campaign theme and the Centre was awash in pink each day with teams and supporters getting into the spirit and dressing up with signage reminding people of what behaviours were encouraged. Sport Waikato staff greeted every person who came into the Centre each day and gave them a sticker and asked them “How was the vibe today?”. This was a highly successful campaign and from feedback we believe it did help create a positive atmosphere during a very competitive event. We will roll out this campaign as part of our season competitions in 2024.

While these events were happening, our Centre continued to operate a full season. It was so pleasing to see participation numbers recover and grow from previous years. There is strong growth in our futureFERNs programmes which is really exciting as these players are the future of our Centre. We were able to get up and running this year a Mixed Secondary Competition with 6 teams entering. The athleticism of the males on court really is a spectacle to watch.

2023 saw many successes for members beyond our Centre and region with some gaining international honors. We are always so proud to be able to say that these people are part of our HCNC community. There is a special feeling when you turn on your TV and there is a player that was part of our Rep programme or an umpire or bench official, we see each week at Premier Indoor.

The volunteers and staff have really stepped up this year and put in some incredible hours and effort to give us the season that we had. All of this was done with a lot of laughs and smiles and a genuine love of providing the game of netball to our Community.

I have really enjoyed this year working with other sports to benefit participants of all sports in the greater Waikato. There is a trend in recent years of declining participation in sport and declining levels of activity across NZ. It is through communication with other sports and collaborative projects like the Multi-Sport Holiday programme, that we are able to keep our communities active and participating in sports. There are many learnings to be gained from different sports and often there are resources that can be shared to increase efficiencies. It also gives us a stronger voice when we work together and approach organisations to gain change in the sports environment.

We are in a challenging landscape in many ways at present, but it is through being innovative, collaborative and connected that netball and HCNC will continue to be a strong presence in the community in the future. I believe the new HCNC Strategic plan “Poipoi te Manawa – Nurturing the Heart of Netball”, gives great guidance for the Centre as we move forward into tomorrow.

Open Grade

Our pinnacle competition the Premier Indoor Open Grade invited an additional 4 teams into the competition in 2023. The 16 teams were then divided into Premier A and Premier B to create 2 grades. This change has been well received by teams, umpires, and bench officials. 4 more teams now have the chance to be part of the atmosphere and the challenge that is premier netball. There are now more opportunities for umpires and bench officials to experience and progress through to the higher levels of the game. Adding in promotion opportunities between the grades mid-season created an opportunity for teams to strive towards as well as ensuring teams were in the right grades.

Saturday Open Grade continues to be a stable competition where we see the same teams and players return season after season to enjoy the game. We have very few issues within these grades but do see a lot of smiles and friendships forged and strengthened.

Thursday Open Grade it was really pleasing to see the team numbers recovering as predominantly Mums are able to get back on the court and have some time out for themselves. The addition of a Duty Umpire each week has seen the quality of netball improve and more teams having a positive experience each week.

Thank you to Jenny Gerrand and Diane Overwater who provide such calm, sound advice to ensure that the Open Grade competitions continue to meet the needs of the community.

futureFERNs

The 2023 futureFERNs season was an amazing first season for me. I was lucky that Irene was able to hand over the programme and give me everything I needed to run the 2023 season. She was able to provide advice and/or assistance whenever I needed it.

We did have to deal with a wave of the flu that took out a lot of our teams, however, other teams were very willing to play extra games to help reduce the number of defaults. Cyclone Gabriel and some heavy rain in the middle of the season meant we had to cancel a few nights, but the kids' safety had to come first.

The futureFERNs team numbers are continuing to grow. We had a 12 team increase from the 2022 season and a 34 team increase from the 2021 season. Our biggest age group is the Year 5-6 by far, we ran 3 rounds this season which were almost completely full!

We chose to continue grading the Year 3-6 teams by the 3 different skill levels that were implemented in the 2022 season: *"Teams Learning their Netball"*, *"Teams Developing their Netball"*, and *"Teams Understanding their Netball"*. We found that these levels were easier for coaches/managers to determine which level their kids are at, rather than using A Grade, B Grade etc. This meant that after the 3 weeks of grading, Margaret Webby and I didn't need to shuffle the teams around very much.

We chose to continue the *"Rule of the Week"* for the Year 5-6's during the first 9 weeks of the season. Prior to the game week, I would send teams a *"Skill of the Week"* along with the *"Rule of the Week"* which align together.

I continued the Umpires meeting 10 minutes prior to the beginning of each round to explain the *"Rule of the Week"*. The one issue I found this season is that there wasn't many Umpires attending this meeting which caused opposing opinions of what is the correct level of umpiring for Year 5-6. Some Umpires were too relaxed while others were too strict. However, majority of the time, the *"Rule of the Week"* meeting was very helpful for those less experienced umpires to better understand the game. For the 2024 season, I'm going to announce the rule of the week over the speaker, so everyone is aware, not just the umpires.

In response to adverse weather conditions in August, we opted to cancel the Festival Day for 2023. This was met with considerable disappointment but proceeding with the event would not have provided an enjoyable experience for the participating children.

I'm extremely thankful for my workmates and our incredible volunteers who made this season possible and helped me get through my first year here at HCNC!

A big thank you to our officials, coaches, and supporters for putting in so much mahi to make netball possible for our kids. A special thank you to Margaret Webby for all the hard work you have put in over the season, from Year 1-8 and every Wednesday, Thursday, and Saturday that you are at the courts. I could not have got through my first season without you! Another big thank you to the rest of the futureFERNs volunteer team, Christine Clark, Lesley Satherly, Josephine van der Poel, Jenny Stone, and Renee Boyd, you all put in so much time to help this year and it did not go unnoticed.

Player Development

2023 was a big year for the Player Development space at HCNC. The commitment to enhancing the HCNC community remains my priority. The focus is to be able to give as many development opportunities as possible through the Poipoia te Manawa programmes and more.

Some of our Poipoia te Manawa programmes run over a 6 to 8 week period. These include Pre-season, In-season, and Post-Season skill sessions. In 2023, these programmes connected with over 180 participants across the age groups. 1-2 day Skill Camps in 2023 connected with over 280 participants across April, July, and October school holidays. These programmes are run based on adapted Netball NZ resources for futureFERNS and PDP [Player Development Programme]. These programmes, particularly those from Year 7 and above, emphasize Athlete Development both on and off the court. NetballSmart, PlayerSmart, and the principle of Balance is Better is a key focus.

We recently introduced Intro to 7v7 sessions. These sessions run in term 1 to provide a learning experience for those new to the 7v7 format, as well as for Year 7 players transitioning from the 6v6 to the 7v7 game. The sessions have both theory and practical learning. This included the NetballSmart warm-up.

In 2023, the Representative Programme at HCNC experienced growth. The Representative teams expanded to 1 x Open team, 2 x Under 18 teams, 1 x Under 17 Men's team, along with 2 x Under 16 and 2 x Under 14 teams. This broader representation across various age groups reflects the Centre's commitment to fostering development and providing opportunities for players at different developmental stages. All teams attend weekend tournaments during the Representative season, including the HCNC tournament. In 2023 a Centre Day was introduced to the Representative Programme involving the Under 18, Under 16 & Under 14 teams. The purpose of the Centre Day is to provide a space for players and management of all teams to connect as a group and prepare for the coming season on and off the netball court. Centre Day was well supported and will continue in 2024.

The Hamilton City Open team participated in the NNZ Champs in Dunedin. Hamilton City Netball Centre hosted the NNZ Under 18 Champs which introduced the U17 Men's grade for the first time. The excitement reached new heights as both the Hamilton City U18A and U17 Men teams advanced to the finals, in front of an enthusiastic home crowd. Both teams finished in 2nd place. Meanwhile, the North Island Junior Champs for U14-U16 teams took place in Taranaki. All teams representing Hamilton City had a great season, with the A team's securing top 10 in each championship.

In its third year, HCNC continued to provide a development programme. Players who had participated in representative team trials but were not selected had the opportunity to trial for the development squads. This year, the development programme comprised of two Under 16 teams and one Under 14 team. It's important to note that these development teams, while not competing in longer tournaments, still function as representative teams, attending day tournaments to foster player growth and skill development.

Hamilton City had the privilege of hosting the Waikato Bay of Plenty (WBOP) Magic in the Making Cluster Day. This event serves as a pathway opportunity for aspiring players. Players were selected by the WBOP pathway group from identification at tournaments and centre nominations held throughout the season. Centre coaches and umpires were welcomed to be part of the day and gather learning experiences from the session. The Cluster Day comprised

of testing and coaching from WBOP staff and Magic players. Players who stood out during the event were then considered for future opportunities, such as participation in the WBOP Magic in the Making advanced camp. Beyond that, outstanding individuals had the chance to be selected for the NZ NDC (National Development Camp).

The success of our programmes relies on the incredible individuals within the HCNC community who generously volunteer their time. These volunteers help organise trials, umpires, tournaments, and more. Special recognition to the Coaches and Managers who lead representative and development teams throughout the season.

Congratulations and thanks go to the players selected into teams to represent Hamilton City. Your involvement and commitment support us to deliver successful programmes.

Each year we take learnings from the previous year to better our programmes. As we move into the 2024 season, it is an exciting time to start our planning and collaborative efforts, working together to provide a great development programme for our Netball Community.

Coach Development

Coaching opportunities at the Hamilton City Netball Centre are expanding. Throughout 2023, we continually sought avenues to provide development for coaches.

Every year, coaching workshops are held to provide theory and practical opportunities for community coaches at various levels. In 2023, a total of six futureFERNs, one Intermediate, one Student and 15 CCA (Community Coach) workshops were delivered, benefiting over 100 coaches within the community. 2023 also saw the extension of Student Coach opportunities into Secondary Schools where 21 students across two schools were engaged in upskilling initiatives.

Poipoia te Manawa programmes provide opportunities for coaches. Working alongside Hamilton City Netball Centre staff, representative coaches and community coaches to upskill and focus on player development.

The Junior coach programme continues to be successful. Junior coaches are actively involved in the futureFERNs programmes, and some take on coaching responsibilities for our Poipoia te Manawa Skill Sessions and Camps.

The Hamilton City Netball Centre's Representative and Development teams follow an appointment process to designate coaches, guiding them through their coaching journey. Support is given throughout the season to coaches and managers on and off the court. A coach review process has also been implemented to gain feedback and debrief on the season.

Coach development is an important part of netball and the Poipoia te Manawa programmes at Hamilton City Netball Centre with the aim to support coaches to be able to provide a great experience for players to grow a lifelong love of the game. As we work on planning for 2024, our focus will be to look at more ways we can provide coach development for the Hamilton City Netball Centre community.

Basis of Preparation

Hamilton City Netball Centre Inc has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. Goods and Services Tax (GST)

My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause an entity to cease to continue as a going concern.
- * Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.
- * Perform procedures to obtain evidence about and evaluate whether the reported outcomes and outputs, and quantification of the outputs to the extent practicable, are relevant, reliable, comparable and understandable.

I communicate with management and the governing body regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during the audit.
